Being in the right place at the right time on the soccer field allows us to make qualified, split second decisions about our next action. The same is true in our spiritual life. The more knowledge we gain of the Scriptures; the better we know the Person and sovereignty of God, the more we can discern His will in any given situation. However, we must be careful not to simply acquire head knowledge – accumulating facts at the expense of cultivating an intimate relationship with Christ. Knowing ABOUT Jesus and knowing Him PERSONALLY are two entirely different matters. The latter plays itself out in passionately sharing our faith, based on the firm foundation of His Word. The former often “puffs us up” with pride and self-righteousness. So let us press on with knowledge in our head, fire in our belly and desire in our heart to be Christ’s ambassadors. After all, even the greatest mind can learn new truths, and EVERY believer has an incredible message of hope, peace, love and Good News to proclaim!
