

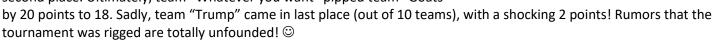
SEASON TRAINING - WEEK 10

series of suggestions, the answer was given. The word is "ALL". It appears 5,310 times, and it simply leaves no room for misunderstanding. So when Scripture declares that, "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23), there can be no mistaking that "ALL" means everyone, including you and me! Thankfully, we read in Isaiah 38: 17 that God has, "Thrown ALL my sins behind my back" and in that in Proverbs 3:5-6 we are to "Trust the Lord with ALL our heart" and in "ALL our ways acknowledge Him". Matthew 11:28 calls us to "Come to me ALL who are weary and burdened" while Matthew 22:37 commands us to "Love the Lord your God with ALL your heart, with ALL your soul, and with ALL your mind." Interesting how such a small word can have such huge implications! Thankfully Jesus gave His ALL to allow us ALL to be ALL He created us to be!



As in our spiritual walk, so it should be in our athletic endeavors. We are to be "ALL-IN". We are to strive for excellence. That means being sold-out for the program, the culture, your team. Being punctual, respectful, and resourceful. It means giving your ALL at ALL times and in ALL circumstances.
