DEVOTIONAL THEME: HUMILITY

Having completed our study on Spiritual Disciplines, our remaining end of session devotionals will focus on just one aspect of Godly character: Humility. Webster's dictionary defines humility as, “Freedom from pride or arrogance.” Famed British writer and theologian C.S. Lewis said, “Humility is not thinking less of yourself, but thinking of yourself less.” Imagine that. Thinking less of our own desires, our own needs, our own “greeds”. What a revolutionary concept, but oh how refreshing! So this week, we simply asked the question: “What are you (we) full of? Here are the 3 choices:



Full of pride? You boast about what you've done or what you're going to do. You enjoy the attention others give to you because of your success. Pride and boasting says, “I deserve admiration because I have achieved so much”

Full of self-pity? You feel sorry for yourself because things aren't going your way or you don't receive recognition for what you do. Self-pity says, “I deserve admiration because I have sacrificed so much”

Full of humility? You recognize that everything you have – everything you own or achieve – everything is a gift from God. Humility says, “Thank you Lord, for blessing me with your gifts, and for being ever-present in my life. All I have is yours. All I am is because of you. May I live humbly to emulate the life of Christ living in and through me, striving to become more and more like the One who came to serve and give His life as a ransom for many” (Mark 10:45).

Pride is ugly – Humility is appealing. Pride looks down on people – Humility looks up to God. Pride is self-promoting – Humility recognizes (and thanks) the efforts of others.
